

School Profile 2025-26

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Community

Nestled in the city of Fort Collins, Colorado Early Colleges serves the entire northern Colorado area from the Wyoming State line in the north, the northern suburbs of Denver to the south, the plains of eastern Colorado, and to the foothills of the Rockies to the west. Colorado Early Colleges is under the authorization of the Colorado Charter School Institute which authorizes forty-one charter schools in the state ranging from K-12th grades. Fort Collins is consistently ranked as one of the "best places to live" by the top trade magazines and publications. The student body consists of a population of 73% Caucasian, 17% Hispanic, 2% African American, 3% Asian or Pacific Islander, and 5% of additional ethnicities.

School

Colorado Early Colleges is a comprehensive four-year public charter college preparatory high school that offers students the opportunity to earn an associate degree, postsecondary credential, or at least 60+ college credits towards the completion of a postsecondary credential. while in high school. During the 2024-2025 school year 794 students in grades 9-12 were enrolled. The school opened in the fall of 2012. Colorado Early Colleges is accredited by the Colorado Department of Education and is chartered under the Charter School Institute of Colorado.

Curriculum

The academic program is organized around the model of students earning their associate degree, 60+ college credits, and/or postsecondary credentials while in high school, for free. The school currently pays up to \$4,800.00 each year per student, which covers students' tuition, fees, and required textbooks. Upon initial enrollment, every student takes the ACCUPLACER exam or Maps testing, administered by the College Board, which determines placement into college prep or college level courses. Students can place directly into College Composition I (ENG 1021) upon enrollment and never be required to take a high school level (college prep) English course. Students that place into College Algebra (MAT 1340), must have completed Algebra I, Geometry, and Algebra II before taking College Algebra. Students average about five courses a semester, which is all dependent upon a student's academic course load. For instance, a student that is completely college ready might only take ENG 1021 (3 college credits), MAT 1340 (4 college credits), and BIO 1111 (5 college credits). This student only takes three classes but is still considered to be taking a full academic load (12 college credits). Every course on campus is on a semester schedule. Classes are 60-120 minutes. College Prep courses are usually five days per week, while college level courses, taught on the CEC campus, are two, three, four, or five days a week courses depending on the credit level and contact hours requirement set forth by the community college (Front Range Community College, Aims Community College, or Red Rocks Community College).

For the 2025-26 school year, 59 college classes are offered on the CEC campus during the school day. These classes are a combination of Front Range Community College and Aims Community College courses ranging from 1 – 5 college credits. Many courses have multiple sections taught throughout the day. Students take college courses on the CEC campus, and once they have exhausted the courses, they need for their intended associate degree, take the remainder of their courses at Front Range Community College, Aims Community College, and or Red Rocks Community College. Each semester, students can re-take the ACCUPLACER exam for placement into a college-level course, if needed. ACT or SAT exam scores can be used in lieu of ACCUPLACER scores, dependent upon the required benchmark scores set by the colleges,

Rank

Students are ranked based upon their weighted GPA. Valedictorians and Salutatorians are determined based upon their weighted GPA and must earn an associate degree. Final class rank is determined at the end of March after updating students' high school transcript from completed fall semester courses.

Grade Point Average (GPA) Calculation

GPA is computed using the above quality points. Beginning with grade nine, all subjects, whether passed or failed, are included in the computation. A minimum of 20 credits is **required for graduation**. Graduates earn special distinction based off their weighted GPA. Graduates that have a cumulative weighted GPA of 3.75-3.89 are distinguished as Cum Laude, 3.9-4.199 cumulative weighted GPA are considered Magna Cum Laude, and 4.2-5.0 cumulative weighted GPA are awarded Summa Cum Laude. **College level classes are weighted** (see above). The college level formula is used to determine a weighted GPA. Grades are recorded on the transcript, ACT or SAT scores are not on transcripts. GPA is computed in January and June.

Class of 2025

There were **211** graduates in the Class of 2025. Based off weighted GPA 60% of graduates earned a 3.5 or higher GPA. Average weighted GPA is 3.65.
